Dear Friends in Christ,

I can't recall a time when so many people have consistently talked about how they feel that things have gone so horribly wrong. Make no mistake. The sentiment is not a new one. All of my adult, there has always been someone to assure me that the world is going to hell in a hand basket. What is new is not so much the sentiment, but that the sentiment is so *pervasive*. I cannot recall a time when I have felt such an allencompassing sense of what looks a lot to me like grief.

Equally pervasive is a new universal attempt to make sense of it. The question is posed in a variety of ways. "How did it happen?" "What went wrong?" "How did we ever arrive at this point?" Or sometimes it is not so much a question as it is an observation: "This is a new normal." I am not going to pretend to explain it. There are plenty of essays out there written by people much more insightful than me explaining HOW IT ALL CAME TO THIS.

Ultimately, it will be up to historians, sociologists, and political scientists to make sense of that. In the meantime, what we in the church have to offer is a faith perspective. Faith recognizes that life is a pilgrimage. Whatever this moment in time is, faith teaches me that this is not the end of the road. In fact, what I prize about Christianity is that faith is not even the destination. Faith *is* the road we travel. And I am not being particularly original when I say that. The earliest Christians did not call themselves "the Church." They called themselves "the Way." So, when I submit to you that to be Christian is to be on a pilgrimage, on a "way," I am merely drafting off of those first followers of Jesus who started us down this road in the first place.

But what do we do when in our pilgrimage we encounter so much grief along nearly every bend in the road? This coming Lent, you are invited to join us each Wednesday as we continue our faith journey under the theme, **The Pilgrimage from Death to Abundant Life**; *Moving Beyond the Rage and Fear of Our Times*.

Each week, we will gather between 6:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. for a simple soup meal. From there, we will move into the sanctuary and consider the different places our faith has we will move into the sanctuary and consider the different places our faith has brought us and as we also begin to stir and move confidently forward to the new places our faith will bring us.

February 14 (Ash Wednesday): From Wilderness to Words

February 21 (Week of Lent 1): From Denial to Awareness

February 28 (Week of Lent 2): From Suffering to Joy

March 7 (Week of Lent 3): From Alienation to Companionship

March 14 (Week of Lent 4): From Persecution to Beloved Community

March 21 (Week of Lent 5): From Fear to Faith

So, please. Come as you are. Bring your grief and remorse. Bring your shame and guilt. Bring your fears and dread. Bring your hopes and dreams. Together, we will find a way through.

The conversation took place at precisely the right time. Retired Pastor Mark Reitan offered to serve as a respite pastor, enabling a pastor and

congregation the necessary breathing room they needed. Mark's heart aches for pastors on whom the job takes a toll. Mark knew it would mean a lot to him if he could help another sister or brother.

There were a few conditions. He didn't want it to be long term – no more than two or three months. He knew there would be certain Sundays he wouldn't be available. He was only willing to preach and do critical pastoral care. (No committee meetings!) AND he wanted to do it pro bono, believing that God has been a wonderful provider for him and his family. The one exception is he would expect a mileage reimbursement.

Mark is like many of our retired pastors. He still loves to do pastoral ministry. He finds meaning in trying to help a faith community realize their strengths. He loves to preach the gospel and is so clear about our God who provides. He is a living example of what he believes.

No sooner had we had the conversation, when just the right setting turned up. We had a congregation that was small in size and struggling financially. A separation agreement between the pastor and the congregation had been reached providing the compensation the pastor would need to reach retirement. However, the congregation did not have the capacity to resource the separation agreement and provide for a part-time pastor. This is where Mark stepped in and so graciously cared for the congregation for three months. The congregation understood that there would be Sundays when Mark couldn't be there, and they managed to do well with supply pastors.

This was an amazing win-win-win situation for pastor, church, and synod. All because of a pastor's desire to still do meaningful ministry - and meaningful it was. Mark was able to love up this congregation, affirm their strengths, and restore in them a greater confidence that God provides for those who place their trust in God.

This changed the conversation from "should we just close our doors" to "let's reimagine our future."

Mark was able to share with them the work that he and his spouse, Elaine, are doing in Tanzania to honor their daughter's life and death. This proved to be an inspiration to the congregation and expanded their sense of the church's global ministry. When the time came for Mark to conclude his ministry, the congregation offered up a gift for this ministry as a sign of their deep appreciation for Mark's time among them.

I respect and admire Pastor Reitan for his love of the gospel and his desire to continue to live it out in ways that bring blessing to his own life and to those he serves.

These are not the easiest of times in which to do ministry and the truth is there are so many pastors and congregations that could benefit from a time of respite care. I don't doubt a few of you reading this article are saying, "I am that pastor," or "we might be that congregation."

While I know that all retired pastors are not in the position to serve in this capacity, my prayer is that there might be a few who would consider offering up their gifts. I know pastors well into their 80's who are vital, passionate about the Gospel, and who could do some wonderful ministry. Thank you Pastor Mark Reitan for modeling what it means to be a faithful servant of God and inspiring others to consider how God might have a short jog in store for them.

#### STEWARDSHIP NEWS



In early February I took a drive to Rockport State Park. The weather was the usual February, gray and threatening rain as I headed north intending to turn east at Burlington. Instead, the GPS took me off the freeway at Arlington, several miles south of Burlington. I hadn't explored this area, so I followed the route directed by the GPS. As I wandered east on Highway 530, I alternated between enjoying the countryside and getting anxious about how long it was taking to get to my destination. The town of Oso surprised me and I

This day-trip refreshed me. My focus had narrowed and getting out in nature expanded my field of vision. As we head into Lent, I plan to use the season to expand and sustain a wider frame of mind. I want to pay better attention to the connections and commitments I already have. I would like to engage in some sort of community action. The route through Lent may not be the one I intended and it may be slow, but the destination will be the same- Easter. What route will you take this Lenten season on your way to Easter?



#### A one-week, incredible opportunity!!

Hopefully, this claim has snagged your attention. I want all of you to mark July 1-6 on your calendars. This is the week that the Special Olympics USA games will be held here in Seattle! Athletes from across the United States

will gather in Seattle to celebrate and unite through sports. There are hundreds of ways for you to be involved as a volunteer—serving meals, accompanying athletes, cheering in the stands—just to name a few. As a church, Ballard First will be getting involved to volunteer with the 2018 Seattle Games.

I was blessed with the opportunity to volunteer with the Malaysia delegation for the 2015 Special Olympics World Games in Los Angeles. So, to help get you excited for the opportunities that lie ahead for Ballard First this summer, I wanted to share a little bit of my reflections from a blog post following the 2015 games (This was published August 11, 2015):

"That evening, we welcomed team Malaysia to LA. 39 athletes and coaches made the long journey from Malaysia. Suddenly I was surrounded by the Malay language, of course talking all about the food I loved and the athletes' favorite foods. We journeyed together to our host town for the first couple days, Culver City, where we stayed to get acclimated to LA and take some time to prep for the games.

Once we moved from our host town into our respective lodging at USC and UCLA, the games began. I spent my days accompanying the team and cheering at the track, pool, bowling alley, soccer field, equestrian center, golf course, and bocce court. We dealt with questions and situations as they came up, but mostly my time was spent doing what I learned to do in Malaysia- being. It was a busy "being," as in some days I didn't necessarily have time for all my meals. I woke up early and went to bed late, but those 2 weeks were full of such joy. In our first days together, the Malaysia head coach, Mr. Jayasingh gave those of us volunteering with the Malaysia team a Special Olympics pin. He said, 'You're a part of this family. Whatever we do in the next 2 weeks, we do it together.' It's funny when you think you are called somewhere for one thing, only to learn that something a little different is in store. I went to LA to help host the Malaysia team, but oddly enough I found myself being hosted and welcomed by team Malaysia, too. Jesus is sneaky like that, I think.

"Two weeks passed so quickly. Before I realized it, competitions were coming to an end, Malaysia was bringing in medals every day, and athletes were celebrating their incredible accomplishments as a team. Malaysia brought home a total of 21 medals from the games. It was an honor to have the opportunity to be a part of this worldwide event. Again, it was time to say goodbye.

"I left feeling full- full from good conversations, full from time spent with incredible, loving people, full from meeting Jesus in the faces and words of so many people. And while I arrived feeling tired and a little scared, I left having found rest. I was content and at peace in ways I hadn't been in so long. The camp I worked at in college had a hashtag one summer after I was gone, #TotalKairosMoment, to describe times when God's time and our time meet. I am one who finds myself looking to what's next often, almost always in a countdown mode of some sort. But there are times when I am pushed away from the countdown. What's next will come... later. But now, be present and aware of the ways God is actively at work in your midst."


